

Don Bosco was an Italian Roman Catholic Priest, Educator and Writer of the 19th century. While working in Turin, where the population suffered many of the effects of industrialization and urbanization, he dedicated his life to the betterment and education of street children, juvenile delinquents, and other disadvantaged youth. He developed teaching methods based on love rather than punishment, a method that became known as the 'Salesian Preventive System'.

History

In May, 1991, we started as a night shelter for street children and youth in rented facilities at Bishop Pereira Hall, Shankumugham, and later on in Chalai Market. A society was registered on 9th December 1991 as, 'The Trivandrum Don Bosco Veedu Society'. In 1994, a building was bought at Manacaud and the shelter home was named 'Don Bosco Veedu'. Later on, in collaboration with Latin Arch Diocese of Trivandrum, Don Bosco Centre, Manacaud was constructed and in 1999 a property was bought near railway station, Thampanoor, and a shelter home was built for children at risk, named as Don Bosco Nivas and it was inaugurated on January 31st, 2002.

DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

"Migrants and refugees are not pawns on the chess board of humanity" Pope Francis.

Genuine social work requires adaptation and reinventing in order to stay alive and relevant. Issues faced by every society changes with changes in the socio-economic and demographic conditions. An authentic social work institution needs to be open to new challenges and requires intervening effectively to address such challenges with creative solutions.

During this year, Trivandrum Don Bosco Veedu Society has entered into a new area of intervention which we feel is a relevant and burning issue in Kerala society. In the past few years, Kerala's manual labour force has been migrants from other states of India. As people of Kerala have migrated to other countries and the socio-economic conditions have improved, there has been a dearth of unskilled as well as skilled labourers in the State. This has resulted in a great inflow of migrant labourers in every field of work. As the payments for every field of work in Kerala is much higher compared to other states, there have been lots of migrant labourers in every industry as well as in the unorganised sector. It is estimated that about 10% of the population are migrant labourers.

Migration is fundamentally the story of the human race from its origins to the present. Migration is an integral aspect of life on this planet. People move to survive. They move in search of food. They move away from danger and death. They move towards opportunities for life. Such movement affects the communities migrants leave and the communities that receive these migrants. There needs to be a mutual give and take in this process but unfortunately there are lots of issues of rights violations and exploitations in this process.

The interstate migrant are a vulnerable group who require assistance in living a dignified life free from exploitations, help in social integration and aid to improve their living conditions among many other needs. We have decided to pitch in with interventions to address these issues so that proper solutions can be found in unison with major stake holders.

Requesting every reader's attention to this focus, I would like to present before you this year's annual report.







Brighter Tomorrow

Behavioral Issues in children are fairly commonplace and is rectified as they grow older and more sensible. But a very important step in this process is identifying and addressing these undesirable traits, which the adults have to be on the lookout for. One such incident, duly identified by a reputed school in the district was reported to CHILDLINE Thiruvananthapuram. A 7 year old girl was exhibiting questionable behavior and was seen having talks unsuitable for her young age. Acting upon the same, when the CHILDLINE team reached the school, they were greeted with the familiar face of Saaya. About two years before the reported incident, Saaya's grandmother had reached out to CHILDLINE reporting the girl's mother's death, which was believed to have been committed by her father. Although, she stated how that wasn't the case and explained how she wished to take responsibility of the child's custody but relatives from her mother's side were demanding for the same. The grandmother was deemed fit for the child's safe upbringing by CHILDLINE and the child was handed over to the grandmother after the completion of the legal proceedings with the Child Welfare Committee. Subsequent counseling sessions with the girl proved otherwise, the girl was subject to abuse by the grandmother's second husband and his friends who often used to come over to their house and get drunk. The grandmother's house invariably was seen unsafe for the child, she was shifted to Hindu Mahila Mandiram at Panchavadi after she was rescued by the CHILDLINE team right from the school. There, she were to be greeted by good education, a safe social environment but most importantly a life free of abuse. But what found her was something more wholesome. Chirag and his wife were waiting with open hands and hearts since 15 years, for a child that never came along. They were trying in all ways they could for a child they could call their own and had kept aside a part of them, laden with love. Adoption seemed to be the last resort but they were continually let down by it as years had passed after they had registered but nothing was coming along. That is when they met Saaya. Talk about meant to be's, through the provision for foster care, they brought home Saaya to light, love and a safe and nurturing

Aman Ki Asha

Bloating the country's map with big black stains even today, are the evils of Child Labor. More often than not, it's the child's own family or family members that push them into the vicious cycle of vulnerability, exploitation and abuse. Asha too had one such family. Orphaned at a young age, Asha from Orissa, soon turned into a liability for her two elder brothers. She was sent to a household where she had to do domestic chores in return for money. The money though, was not handed to her, it was paid to her brothers. Disappointing enough in itself, Asha's story becomes more surprising as she was later trafficked to Kerala by her employer through an agent catering human workforce. Known or unknown to her insensitive brothers, Asha was now working at a certain someone's household in Thiruvananthapuram from where she was further sent to his son's house, where his daughter in law had just delivered a baby and Asha was to help her with household chores and in taking care of the newborn baby. Away from home and family, Asha found it difficult working in this unknown land for unknown people and requested the family to send her back home. Instead, fearing getting called out by the girl and getting arrested for illegally employing the minor, they locked her up in one of the rooms. Asha escaped from the house and was spotted dazed and lost on the streets by a Samaritan who went on to inform the same to CHILDLINE. Informed of the same by CHILDLINE, the girl was brought to the local police station following which her statement was taken. The CHILDLINE team produced Asha before the Child Welfare Committee and immediate measures were taken to shift her to Hindu Mahila Mandiram at Poojappura. The case was further transferred to the Child Welfare Committee in Orrisa and Asha was transported to her home state with police escort. The girl was safely handed over to them who went on to house her at an after care home there.

Don Bosco Veedu in Service to Inter-state Migrant Workers

On 21st April 2017, Don Bosco Veedu Society took up the mantle to support and provide advocacy services to inter-state migrant workers coming to the city of Trivandrum to earn their bread and butter. We were among the first to realize the perceived needs of ISM workers in Kerala and hence Sramik Kalyan Kendra (Migrant Help Desk) was born.

Sramik Kalyan Kendra (SKK) is a new initiative to reach out to the large migrant population in the city of Trivandrum. It is part of a network of 7 other "Migrants' Help Desks" recently launched by the Salesians of Don Bosco in Dimapur, Guwahati, Panjim, Tiruppur, Vijayawada and Chennai. SKK's objective is to provide "Rights Based" advocacy services to the marginal section of Migrant Laborers working in Kerala. The Vision of SKK is to give the marginalized migrant Labour class; a voice and enhance their standard of living.

We also have been successful in building a good rapport with the State Government departments, specially the department of Labour and Skill, and essentially have been able to establish Sramik Kalyan Kendra as a resource center with the ability to provide expertise in the field of dealing with interstate migrant issues when called for. We have been sharing the responsibilities of reaching out to interstate migrant Labourers on behalf of the State Government.



Success Story: Leaving no one behind

On 29th November 2017, a very severe cyclonic storm Ockhi formed in the Arabian Sea. It caused havoc and destruction in the southernmost districts of Tamilnadu and Kerala, particularly Kanyakumari District of Tamil Nadu and Thiruvananthapuram District of Kerala. Among the affected population none bore the most number of casualties than the fishing community. However, during this process of finding missing personnel, SKK team had come in contact with Coast Guard officials and it was intimated to us that among the missing persons there were also several Interstate Migrant Labourers who were part of the fishing industry. 16 people working in "Jibin" fishing boat, went to the sea in the morning of 29th November 2017, the boat capsized and all lost their lives. SKK team member Mr. Jerone received two photos of Migrant Labourers along with their names; Mr. Hori Lal and Mr. Arvind Kumar. Allegedly they were also members of "Jibin's Crew" and were missing. No details of their family whereabouts could be found from the boat owner or anywhere else. SKK team painstakingly labored to identify the family members. After a month of strenuous efforts, we procured the phone number of Mr. Arvind Kumar, the brother of Mr. Hori Lal. Contact with the family of both were made during end of December. SKK made arrangement for the families to travel to Trivandrum, and take the DNA tests. DNA tests matched with bodies recovered from sea, and the families were able to complete the last rights. SKK also labored to ensure the families get compensation from Government, which was duly received

Large numbers of young people migrate to unorganized sectors in Kerala and they are unskilled, poor, exploited and their rights are grossly violated. Such poor and young migrants moving from one state to another are not a vote bank and so, no political parties want them at the migrated destinations. They do not know the language of the place, face alienation from the local society, are unable to access their rightful entitlements such as food, shelter, medical care, bank services, education, skill training, legal support and other services. KISMAT is an integrated network of 12 Migrants help desks set up in Don Bosco Salesian houses

across 11 districts in Kerala, being headed by Don Bosco Veedu Society at Trivandrum.

Project Goals

- Set up 12 Migrants' Desks in 11 districts of Kerala state and provide support services through a rights-based approach.
- Make the Don Bosco community an address/place/home where migrants can come in for any emergency or for urgent services and support.
- Build a network of persons and organizations committed to supporting the rights of migrants and empowering them to access them.
- Motivate, accompany and empower migrants to overcome the constraints and deprivations they face.
 - Advocate with the state and others for the rights of migrants, and for creation of better options at the source areas in order to reduce "forced" migration.

KARIMADOM EDUCATION & EMPOWERMENT NETWORK

DON BOSCO KEEN

This project started in January 2018, with the main objective of empowering the children and Women of Karimadom Colony through education and skill development.

As part of the KEEN project Don Bosco Veedu Society is conducting Free Evening tuition's for the children from the colony. Don Bosco also identified Drop out children from the colony and helped them to learn Chenda (an Indian percussion instrument)

The women folk from the colony were provided with skill training in catering allied services, Food processing, paper/cloth bag making training

One day motivational camps were also conducted for children, youth, women and men folk of the colony.

Leadership training was also conducted for the women SHG members of Don Bosco

2. DB KEEN Naturals

The KEEN Naturals is an autonomous society consists of the producers as top level management & Don Bosco as a partner in networking with the market. KEEN naturals is formed as a result of the food processing training. There are 15 women registered with naturals and are supplying Jam, Squash etc

3.KEEN Services

Women from the slum were provided with training in catering and allied services. under the guidance of Don Bosco the women group started a laundry unit on November 2018 stationed at Don Bosco Veedu Manacaud.

About 15 women from the slum are involved in the laundry service unit and are earning a living.

4. Free Chenda classes

About 17 school Dropout children from the slum, who are interested in chenda are identified and provided them training in Chenda. Now the children who are participating in chenda classes are attending the school regularly. There school attendance is monitored effectively by the KEEN Staff.

ABOUT DREAM

Kerala is second in India with largest number of cases related to drug abuse. Ernakulum and Thiruvanathapuram are the two Districts in Kerala having the most number of drug related cases. A survey done among school going children in Trivandrum district by Don Bosco Veedu depicts that about 30 % of children are using drugs. This calls for urgent intervention and we have begun a yearlong campaign to thwart this menace by educating children, counseling, intervening with teachers, excise department and networked efforts to stop this increasing menace that threatens the life and future of children of Kerala Society.

Programs Delivered

DARE- DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION

An Exclusive awareness program conducted among the school children on the harmful effects of using drugs. The DARE session was conducted in 35 schools and covered 3663 high school children. Every DARE session includes visual aid presentation, Quiz Program and group activity.

GENERAL PUBLIC AWARENESS

The team designed attractive leaflets, posters, flip charts and vinyl charts, and organized exhibition in the central train station. They also distributed leaflets in the public area such as museum, central bus station etc.



About 45 high school students from schools of Trivandrum district participated in the poster competition with the topic "Substance Use". The best posters were awarded and ideas of the children was used in preparing the IEC materials for the project.

STATE LEVEL STAKEHOLDERS MEETING

A state level stake holders meeting was conducted as part of the DREAM project, in order to formulate a state level action plan for the prevention of drug use among the children.

CHILDLINE, DCPU, Education department, Health Department, police, Souhrda teachers from the 14 district of Kerala participated in the meeting. The participants were divided into six groups and had a fruitful discussion for formulating an action plan

YOUTH AWARENESS PROGRAM

"The main hope of a nation lies in the proper education of its Youth". With this objective Don Bosco Veedu Society conducted DARE awareness program in 3 colleges in Trivandrum District . Around 350 youth attended the program. The session includes Role play by Excise department named "Padivare Kakaruthe", Quiz competition and poster exhibition
